

### National offer day (16 April 2019)

Herons' Moor Academy has an admission number of 60.

118 preferences have been received for the school. It has, therefore been necessary to use the oversubscription criteria, as outlined below, to determine which of the applicants should be offered the places available.

The 60 available places have been offered to the following applicants:
