Dundry C of E Primary School has an Admission Number of 15. 22 applications have been received for the school. It has, therefore been necessary to use the oversubscription criteria, as outlined below, to determine which of the applicants should be offered the places available.

The 15 available places have been offered to the following applicants:

2	Children who have a sibling attending Dundry Primary School at the time of application, who will still be on roll at the time of admission and who lives at the same home address	6 children
