Allocation Sheet for Tickenham C of E Primary School

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Tickenham C of E Primary School has an Admission Number of 15. 35 applications have been received for the school. It has, therefore been necessary to use the oversubscription criteria, as outlined below, to determine which of the applicants should be offered the places available.

The 15 available places have been offered to the following applicants:

Where a school is named in a child's Statement of Special Educational Needs Education or Health and Care Plan, the admission authority is legally required to admit the child to the school. Therefore such children are allocated places before the criteria, detailed below, are applied.

The distance between home and school for the last child offered a place was 2.444 miles.

teacher per 30 children is met at the school. Any appeals for places at the school are therefore 'infant class size prejudice cases'.
