

Moseying around three Moors

This is a circular walk with the occasional bit of backtracking that follows several water courses round the moors. While it's flat there are many stiles to cross. But the stunning views of the hills as well as the wildlife make it a lovely route.



How to get there

Start at map ref:
ST457715

Car:
Park opposite
the church on the
Causeway, Nailsea.

In some fields there
are livestock so please
keep dogs on leads.

Leave the lay-by heading towards the church and follow the road over the Monkey Bridge. Turn right over the stile and then skirt the edge of the field around the edge of Tickenham Court.

Continue west across the field until you reach the stone footbridge crossing the Middle Yeo. Cross this and continue towards the hills until you reach the next water course (the Land Yeo). Turn left and then follow the footpath along the edge of the Yeo and you will come out onto Moor Lane. Turn left and then after a short distance turn right across the stile and continue along the side of the Middle Yeo again.

The path continues along the side of Middle Yeo, across Tickenham Moor and from here there are great views across to Nailsea Moor and on the other side to Tickenham. There is a series of stiles and bridges to cross and





eventually the path comes out by a larger watercourse – The Yearling Ditch. You are now on Clevedon Moor.

Cross to walk on the Clevedon side of the ditch and turn left walking along its side. Go over Cook's Lane and the Middle Yeo and continue along the edge of the ditch until just before it joins the Blind Yeo. Re-cross the ditch using the

iron footbridge. Head east across the field and then turn right onto the track and over the bridge across the Blind Yeo.

Turn right onto the road (Nailsea Wall) and head back towards Clevedon until you reach the triangle junction. Turn left and just over the bridge take the footpath back along the water's edge. You'll now be heading east along the edge of the River Kenn. When you reach a track and bridge, cross it and then continue along the other side of the river.

The path comes back out onto the road (Nailsea Wall). Turn left and head back a little way and then turn right onto a track. Continue a short distance and then come off the track onto a path on your right. Follow this as it leads you along the edge of another watercourse (Parish Brook) with Nailsea Moor on the left. Look out for wildlife especially herons and kingfishers. After more stiles and gates you'll be able to see the church in the distance. The path comes out on The Causeway where you need to turn left and head along it back to the church.

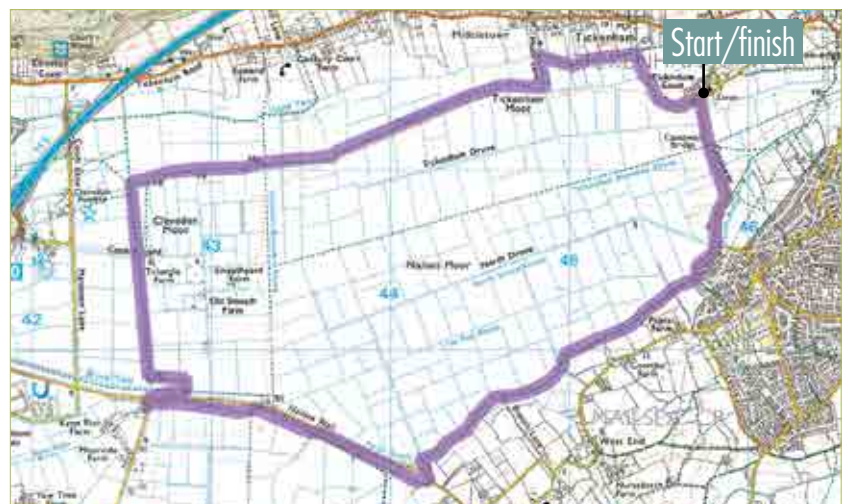
Easy route which doubles-back on itself a couple of times. Flat but a lot of stiles
