**Subject: Regulatory Services Enforcement Policy**

### Reason:

The regulators code came into statutory effect on 6 April 2014 under the Legislative and Reform Act 2006 and provides a clear, flexible, principles based framework for how regulators should engage with those that they regulate. Local authorities have to have regard to it when developing their policies and procedures that guide their regulatory activity.

## **Background:**

The services which combine to make up regulatory services have merged into a new directorate, the Public Health and Regulatory Services Directorate, and the existing enforcement policy required updating to reflect this. This policy does not apply to the Strategic Housing Services, where a specific and separate policy applies to housing related enforcement. Essentially the policy demonstrates the commitment to the principles of good enforcement as set out in the above Act.

### **Decision:**

The Regulatory Services Enforcement Policy is approved and adopted by the Authority.

#### Reasons:

Each local authority has a duty under the above Act to have in place an enforcement policy that is drafted in line with the regulators code.
