North Somerset District Council (Public Conveniences) Public Space Protection Order 2023

- 1. This Order may be cited as the North Somerset District Council (Public Conveniences) Public Space Protection Order 2023.
- 2. This Order shall commence on the date it is made and cease to be of effect on the 12 October 2026
- 3. This Order applies to the public spaces specified in Schedule 1 and imposes restrictions as set out in Schedule 2.
- 4. It is an offence for a person, without reasonable excuse:
 - (a) to do anything a person is prohibited from doing by schedule 2 of this order, or
 - (b) to fail to comply with a requirement to which the person is subject by schedule 2 of this order
- 5. A person guilty of an offence under condition (a) or (b) of article 4 of this order, is liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding level 3 on the standard scale or fixed penalty notice of a maximum of £100.

Schedule 1

Public spaces within North Somerset District Council falling within the following categories

Any public convenience to which the public is entitled or permitted to have access (with or without payment)

Schedule 2

Restrictions

- (1) No person shall
 - (a) cause damage to property
 - (b) improperly soil any part of the public convenience.
 - (c) write on or mark or otherwise deface any part of the public convenience
 - (d) affix any picture or printed or written matter to any part of the public convenience
 - (e) obstruct:
 - (i) any person carrying out their duties which are necessary to the proper maintenance and servicing of the public convenience
 - (iii) any other person in the proper use of the public convenience
- (2) If a Police Constable or Authorised Person reasonably believes that a person has acted contrary to the restrictions placed upon them by a Public Space Protection Order, they must provide their name and address when required to do so
