What is a Deprivation of Liberty?



Liberty means being free to do what you want and go where you want.



Sometimes, people need help to stay safe.



This might mean they are not allowed to go out on their own or make all their own decisions.



That is called a Deprivation of Liberty.

What are the Safeguards?



Safeguards are rules to protect your rights.



They make sure that any deprivation of liberty is fair, necessary, and in your best interests.

What is a Community Deprivation of Liberty?



This means being deprived of your liberty outside a hospital or care home – for example:

- In the home you own, rent, or share with your loved ones.



- In a supported living home

- In a shared lives home

- Extra care housing

What Happens?

If you are being deprived of your liberty in the community:



- 1. The Court of Protection must agree that this is the right thing for you.
- 2. A judge will check:
 - If it is really needed to keep you safe
- If there is no better, less restrictive way for you to be safe



3. Your views and wishes must be heard.

4. You may get support with this from:



- A family member

- A social worker

- An advocate (someone who helps speak up for you)


Your Rights and deprivations of liberty in the community


